






OFAC SANCTIONS TOWARDS IRAN

- The Iranian Transactions and Sanctions Regulations (ITSR) issued by the Office of Foreign Assets Control (OAFC) generally prohibit the exportation, sale or supply of any goods, technology or services from the USA or by a US person to Iran or the Government of Iran.
- In September 2013, OFAC issued the *Iran General License E* (GLE), authorizing nongovernmental organizations to export services to, or related to, Iran in support of certain non-for-profit activities that are designed to directly benefit the Iranian people, which includes

humanitarian projects.



OFAC SANCTIONS TOWARDS IRAN

- The General License E also authorizes transfers of funds in support of the activities authorized therein, up to \$500,000 over a 12-mo period.
- OFAC has confirmed that the ISN Programs (Clinical Research, Continuing Medical Education, Educational Ambassadors, Fellowship, and Sister Centers Programs) are covered by the General License E, and therefore ISN does not need authorization from OFAC.
- OFAC also confirmed that access to ISN newsletters, journals or Academy by Iranian nationals does not require authorization from







ISN POLITICAL ADVOCACY

- Why is advocacy relevant?
- To advance kidney care, education, training, capacity building research are fundamental efforts but to be truly sustainable, we must ensure that the environment in which we operate changes and kidney health becomes a priority in decision-makers' health policy agendas!
- What does ISN do?
 - ISN is the ONLY kidney health civil society organisation in official relations with the World Health Organization and a member of the WHO's Global Coordination Mechanism on NCDs.?
 - ISN is invited to contribute and makes official statements at WHO and UN global meeting, provides evidence material to decisions makers, partakes in international conferences, and builds alliances within the NCD community to raise the profile of kidney disease in global health politics.
 - Some practical outputs:
 - ISN is the only kidney organisation invited to speak at the United Nations General Assembly and WHO high level meetings
 - In collaboration with WHO, we are developing an Observatory on CKDu aimed at sharing knowledge on this subject and raise awareness
 - In collaboration with WHO, we are developing guidance documents on how to set up dialysis in low resource setting

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



Introduction


In 2017 the ISN established 'Sharing Expertise to support the set-up of Renal Registries' (SharE-RR) to help countries develop a registry.
